Stage one and two are running concurrently, with stage one handed over on July 25 and stage two to be completed in early September.


Once these stages are completed, the club will relocate to the new building. This will allow work to commence on the final stage, entailing the refurbishment of the upper ground floor.


Chairman Jack Hutchinson, who has worked with Ian during that time, said Ian has been an integral and invaluable part of Hutchinson Builders.


Keperra Sanctuary Retirement Village

Work is well underway on Stage 7B of the Keperra Sanctuary Retirement Village for IOOF Community Villages.

Stage 7B consists of 17 self-contained units and incorporates all roadworks and associated services.

The construction cost is approximately \$1.65 million and the contract is being undertaken on a construction management basis.

We are also negotiating to build the new hostel contract which is valued at \$3 million, and is due to start in September.

Brisbane Arcade

Work has recently commenced on a \$3.4 million upgrade of services and structure to the Brisbane Arcade.

This contract includes work to the existing basement, where the whole floor structure is being pulled up, with new service trenches being constructed below the floor to allow easy access to new services.

The contract also includes the construction of a new plant room structure at existing roof level and the installation of a new lift shaft.

The work is being undertaken on a construction management basis.

The site foreman is Paul DeJong and the supervisor is Robert Weymouth.


Brothers Leagues Club, Mackay

The refurbishment and alterations to Brothers Leagues Club, Mackay, is yet another club project that we have with Project Leaders.

This contract is worth \$1.4 million, and when complete will transform the Leagues Club into the premier club in Mackay.

Completion of Stage 1 of the threestage contract was handed over last month.

Site foreman is Michael DeJong and supervisor is Len White.

Construction is nearly complete on both these sets of quality unit developments for Blades Project Services and Petrac Properties.

Work is progressing well on a set of eight units for Consolidated Properties in Jerdanefield St, St Lucia.

These units are again of top quality in classy St Lucia, with selling prices in excess of \$200,000 each.

Our contract value is \$935,000, and the contract is a design and construct type contract. The site foreman is Terry Wilson and the supervisor is Robert Weymouth.

Gold Coast – Diamond Sands

Hutchies have now commenced three more projects as well as the Sandringham Units reported in the last issue.

We are coming out of the ground on the Diamond Sands project at Mermaid Beach.

This is a 93 unit low-rise resort valued at \$9.3 million.

The general foreman is Alan Hindmarsh and the supervisor is Greg Cree.

A further stage of this project is currently being designed and we are negotiating for the construction.

Gold Coast Hospital

We have also commenced work on a \$1 million refurbishment of Gold Coast Hospital Accident & Emergency section for Q-Build.

Brian Hill is looking after this job, with Greg Cree again supervising.

Broadwater Keys

Site possession has been granted for Broadwater Keys, an old motel at Labrador which is being refurbished into bed sitter units.

This job has a value of \$1 million and is being completed for Warren Wadley Pty Ltd.


To add some culture to the evening, Hutchies brought in an international guest speaker, Mr Gordon Reynolds, of Cambridge, England.

Neither the audience, the award winners, or Mr Reynolds remember what his speech was about.



LEFT: Robert Weymouth takes hold of his new rod ... rather excitedly.




