GREAT PERFORMANCE EXPECTED AT THEATRE

E curtain has gone up on what will be a very public performance by the Hutchies' team on the controversial renovation of Toowoomba's historic Empire Theatre.

Hutchies got the nod for the job with a \$9.5 million bid - the lowest of five submissions considered by the Toowoomba City Council.

The \$12.5 renovation will create an art deco community cultural centre with a 1548 seat auditorium, contemporary backstage facilities, restaurant, administration offices, rehearsal stage and rooms, dressing rooms and corporate entertainment facilities.

Work is expected to be completed in March/April next year following an anticipated 40 week construction program.

The Empire was built in 1911, was gutted by fire in 1933 and has been derelict since it closed its doors in 1971.

Scott Hutchinson said he had no doubt that Hutchies' track record had as much to do with winning the contract as their competitive pricing did.

"As well as having the best price, Council placed a great deal of emphasis on our reputation and ability to do the job which will be a public showpiece for years to come," Scott said.

"Pubic attention in Toowoomba has been focused on our performance on Brisbane's St Stephen's Cathedral (winner of the Australian Institute of Building Excellence Award), Brisbane Broncos Leagues C Tattersalls Club and Arcade in Bri and Kingfisher Bay Resort on Island.

"Because of its controversial there will be a great deal of public and we will need to turn in our usual performance.

"The rebuilding of the Empire will be a real challenge and will need a real team effort to ensure its ultimate completion at the end of April next year," he added.

Ben Randall and Simon Garlic of CMR are Project Managers with Chris Everding from Hassell Architects as team architect.

Hutchies team are Len White, Grant White, Mario Medrono, Randall Younger and Terry (Wobbles) Wilson.

HALLELUJAH - AND PRAISE THE BUILDER


We need to be able to distinguish what is good in the possibility of change and not get caught in politically correct attitudes.

It was a great day out with only two sleepers in the pack.


Everyone caught enough for a meal or two with plenty of good eating fish such as Red Emperor, Sweetlip, Parrot and Pearl Perch.

BOUNDARY STREET, WEST END

CONDAMINE SPORTS CLUB OF WARWICK


Brett Darby ensured this \$300,000 pl.)

ST VINCENT'S NURSING HOME, NOOSA



QMBA AWARDS DOUBLE WIN


HUTCHINSON Builders won two awards at the Queensland Master Builders' Association's annual dinner.
