

Miner housing major priority for BMA Coal

HUTCHIES is currently involved in the replacement and refurbishment of houses for BMA Coal in Queensland's Bowen Basin.

Managing director, Greg Quinn, said that, over the past couple of years, Hutchies had constructed major projects for BMA throughout the Bowen Basin valued at around \$600 million.

He said, while some of the projects had been on mine sites, many were accommodation projects built directly for BMA, such as construction of new villages, new modular and in-situ houses and townhouses, as well as maintenance and refurbishment of existing dwellings.

"Hutchies has played an important part in BMA's commitment to provide quality accommodation for its workforce throughout the Bowen Basin," said Greg.

"Hutchies' participation in the Bowen Basin has required a significant commitment of our own and at one stage we had 438 workers spread across BMA's projects.

"That capability highlighted one of Hutchies' greatest strengths – being able to mobilise and manage large workforces and ensure they are accommodated and looked after well in the process."

The replacement housing process includes the full demolition or removal of existing dwellings and new modular or insitu-built houses then supplied to BMA.

Meanwhile, the renovation process includes full renovation of each dwelling to BMA specifications, complete with new appliances and air conditioning systems.

Through both processes, the client receives 'as-new' dwellings.

With both replacement and refurbishment, a full turnkey approach is applied to each dwelling, starting with the design process and pricing.

Externally, all dwellings have



new driveways, paths, carports and 6m x 3m sheds installed and all houses are fully fenced as necessary, including turf and landscaping.

Each property has hard and soft landscaping installed because of the high maintenance costs in the harsh weather conditions of the Bowen Basin area.

Hutchies also is working on the installation of 50 modular townhouses for BMA, with all modules manufactured by Hutchies' Modular Division at Yatala. Because of the long travel distances between Yatala and the Bowen Basin, precise logistics and programming are vital to deliver this project on time.

Coordination of all materials, especially long lead time items like garden sheds, garages, car ports, tanks and water pumps, is of great importance.

Greg said the market had clearly softened in recent times and consequently Hutchies' focus was on finding new opportunities to keep all its people engaged in work.

Scenery and safety for island paradise

AN 800-metre long walkway built by Hutchies on Magnetic Island in North Queensland has been an instant success with locals and tourists by providing safe and spectacular views over the Coral Sea.

The \$5 million walkway, known at Gabul Way, connects Nelly and Geoffrey Bays and complements the island's existing 25km walking track network.

Townsville Mayor, Cr Jenny Hill, said that, in addition to its aesthetic appeal, the walkway had greatly improved public safety by separating vehicular traffic from pedestrians and cyclists who had previously shared a narrow, winding road between the two bays.

Mark Phillips, Hutchies' team leader in Townsville, described the project as "difficult and dangerous" due to being built on the side of hill overlooking the ocean.

"Motorists and the construction

team had to contend with one-way traffic, day and night for four months," said Mark.

"There also was full road closure for approximately 10 hours each night for one month to allow lifting of 42 precast panels weighing 10 tonnes each."

The project was accident free – highlighting the great job done by Hutchies' team!

Hutchies started work on the walkway in May 2012 and finished before Christmas, with an official opening in March by Simon Crean, the former Minister of Regional Australia, Regional Development and Local Government.

The project was a joint effort with the Federal Government providing \$4.79 million through its Regional Development Australia Funding program and the Townsville Council contributing \$500,000.

Coles flagship rises from floodwaters



Coles has reopened in Ipswich with the launch of a large, new flagship superstore to replace the one lost in the 2011 floods.

COLES is back in business in Ipswich with the opening of a large new flagship superstore to replace the one which was engulfed just two years earlier in the devastating 2011 floods.

Hutchies got the job of demolishing the old store which was completely destroyed and building its impressive $6000m^2$, flood-proof replacement.

Ipswich Mayor Cr Paul Pisasale officially opened the superstore in February and described it as "a new dimension in food retailing".

"This new Coles is flood-proof and is one of the largest (Coles) stores in Australia," Cr Pisasale said.

"They have built a fantastic, quality product that is a world leader."

As well as providing a further 120 customer carparks, the new Coles has been designed and built to the latest Coles requirements and includes an instore market-style layout with the emphasis on fresh produce.

HUTCHIES' Cairns team has demonstrated creativity and innovation with indigenous involvement in the Hope Vale Multi-Purpose Centre project in North Queensland.

Paul De Jong's team, with the assistance of Hutchies' indigenous program coordinator, Mark Kucks, has worked closely with the client. Hope Vale Aboriginal Shire Council, for a plan that will achieve employment opportunities for the local indigenous community.

In addition, Hutchies has employed two new apprentices, Cheston McLean, an ex-Council apprentice, and new-starter, Leonard Casey. The boys receive part of their apprenticeship induction via Skype, which is being trialled as a training tool due to the remoteness of Hope Vale in Far North Queensland.

Apprentice coordinator, Peter Forsingdal, who visits the boys in the community says they are progressing well.

The Cairns team soon will

commence an \$11 million rehabilitation facility in nearby Cooktown which also will have indigenous employment and training requirements under the Government's 20 per cent Indigenous Employment Policy.

The plan will be to provide continuity of work for many of the Hope Vale people across both projects.

Remote projects boost indigenous

Currently, indigenous apprentices make up eight per cent of Hutchies' apprentice workforce.

In addition, Hutchies' Gold Coast School of Construction (GCSC) is delivering two indigenous preapprentice training programs for specific clients through the Yatala and Toowoomba campuses and many of these will go on to full time careers either with Hutchies or its sub-contractors.

In partnership with Arrow Energy and Energy Skills Queensland, Hutchies' GCSC Campus in Toowoomba has commenced training four indigenous young men who are looking to start a career in the construction industry.

They are currently completing training operations at Hutchies'

7SD Facility with trainer, Peter Rowse, supported by Craig Gooderham and the rest of the Toowoomba team.

On completion of their work experience phase of the program they will be seeking full time apprenticeships.

Hutchies' regional


Levi Corby, manager, estimated construction would be completed by late November, depending largely on weather.

TRUTH Caring community to replace failed public housing complex

HUTCHIES is helping the Tasmanian Government convert a public housing complex with a violent history into a caring community with a bright future.

Tasmanian Housing Minister, Cassy O'Connor, recently announced that Hutchies and Tim Penny Architecture and Interiors would work on the \$5 million refurbishment of a troubled 1950s public housing complex which had been earmarked for demolition.

Hobart's Stainforth Court is acknowledged by the Tasmanian Government as a failed broad-acre public housing experiment of the past and the new concept will be an example of how public housing can be done better.

Housing Minister O'Connor said

lessons had been learned from the wellintentioned mistakes of the past.

"We are reforming social housing with an emphasis on community, liveable design and social diversity," said Ms O'Connor.

"We want this complex to be a place where tenants feel a strong sense of community and a place they are proud to call home."

Hutchies' team leader, Mick Connolly, said the refurbishment of the units would help reduce living costs for tenants, with efficient heating systems, solar hot water and cost-effective lighting.

New features of the complex will include a video intercom system, privacy screens and community spaces with raised garden beds and worm farms.

Restoration sheds light on inner Melbourne's history

RESTORATION of the heritage-listed Goods Shed South into a two-level, highend commercial space and development of an adjacent new six-storey tower in the heart of Melbourne is now complete.

The \$49 million refurbishment in Collins Street, Docklands, presented an opportunity to renew an integral part of inner Melbourne's history with a modern, sustainable design sympathetic to its heritage value. Hutchies undertook the painstaking refurbishment of the Goods Shed South and clock tower as well as the construction of the new section, known as the Lantern Building.

The interiors were designed to be an innovative and contemporary commercial space while retaining the key historical elements of this inner Melbourne landmark.

Best practice neutralises acid sulphate dilemma

HUTCHIES has been praised for its work to remedy acid sulphate contamination found on a client's site in Gladstone.

The acid sulphate was an unexpected find on QGC's Gladstone Supply Base project site, given that the location was not considered an "at risk area" because acid sulphate is usually found in low lying coastal areas.

Hutchies' quality and environment manager, Rita Mann, said it was thought that the ground soil could have been previously transported from elsewhere and deposited at the GSB location.

"When acid sulphate

soils combine with air, oxidisation occurs and iron sulphates are formed and when this soil mixes with water, sulphuric acid is produced," she explained. It was determined that the use of 24 tonnes of lime to neutralise the levels of acidity would be the best remedy to meet best practice guidelines, legislative and local council requirements, cost effectiveness and minimise impact on the project program.

The acid sulphate spoil was treated with lime and spread across the site, using a tyne and turn method on a grader, with the additional lime assisting in the compaction of the soil.

On completion of the remedial work, all reports returned from NATA approved laboratory, Cardno Bowler, cleared the site of acid sulphate soil.

Hutchies' Chairman, Scott Hutchinson, said Hutchies had adopted an environmental commitment to continually improve its performance, make efficient use of natural resources and aspire to zero harm to people and the environment.

"On the QGC site, Hutchies was able to maintain its commitment to the environment while satisfying all local, state and federal government requirements and without imposing excess cost and delay to our client," said Scott.

QGC stated that the process was well managed from the investigation process, risk management, execution of the works and follow up of outstanding actions.

"The immediate attention and resource planning for the change was exceptionally managed," QGC concluded.

This design and construct contract continues Hutchies' strong relationship with QGC, which was established with projects such as the Miles Supply Base and Chinchilla office.

Bridging an important gap in \$20 million rail upgrade

A CRITICAL milestone in the \$20 million upgrade of the Sandgate railway station in Brisbane went off without a hitch recently when Hutchies lifted a new 11-metre footbridge into place, using a 220-tonne crane.

The new footbridge was fabricated on site then lifted into place alongside an existing bridge during closure of the busy rail tracks.

Member for Sandgate, Kerry Millard, said Hutchies' upgrade would improve station facilities and disability access.

"Sandgate is one of the busiest stations on the Brisbane network with more than 1000 customers using the station during each peak period," said Ms Millard.

The upgrade, which is part of Queensland Rail's \$200 million station upgrade works throughout the state, will include raising of both platforms using pre-cast coping

panels, removal of existing footbridge and reinstatement of new overhead footbridge, a refurbished station building, ticket office and toilets, additional platform waiting shelters, passenger information display screens and lifts and stairs to platforms from the new footbridge.

Hutchies conducted all works while maintaining

public access to the station which required intensive planning complemented by QR operations.

The changes will improve accessibility and ensure the station is fully compliant under the Federal Disability Discrimination Act 1992 (DDA).

The project is scheduled for completion mid-year.

million) and the Gladstone Port Authority (\$10 million).


Construction is expected to begin by June and be completed within 12 months.


